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Partnership Participating in “Run for the Money”

The Partnership for Children is making a run for the money — and we need your help!

The event, which will take place March 29, consists of a run/walk for the community and a chance for you to donate to the Partnership and make your money go further.

Then, the foundation will match the funds that each organization receives at up to 100 percent. This means you have the opportunity to as much as double your donation to the Partnership. for school, protect them and ensure that they have the best possible start in life.



Study shows Smart Start is achieving its goals

North Carolina preschoolers participating in high quality child care programs are ahead of their peers who attend low quality programs, finds a new study of Smart Start by researchers at the Frank Porter Graham Child Development Institute at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

The study has three main findings: that child care quality has increased in the study sample during the Smart Start years, that Smart Start-funded activities were positively related to classroom quality and that quality was positively related to children's outcomes.

This independent, two-year study included 512 preschool children at 110 child care programs in 20 Smart Start counties.

"Thanks to Smart Start, licensed child care providers meet higher standards than they did five years ago, and most exceed the

minimum standard as measured by our state's STAR rating system," said Sherry Browning, executive director of the Partnership for Children of Lincoln & Gaston Counties, the organization that administers Smart Start funds locally.

Children in the study were assessed on their language, early literacy, math and social-emotional skills—abilities deemed important for success in kindergarten. Children participating in high quality child care programs scored significantly better on language, book awareness and knowledge, math and counting skills, than did children from low quality centers.

The local Partnership for Children has worked since its opening in 1998 to increase the quality of care available in local child care centers. Through Smart Start, local child care has improved by leaps and

bounds.

Two years ago, less than 13 percent of local child care centers were above the minimum standard. Today, more than 70 percent are above the minimum, even though the standards have been raised. The Partnership has worked with at least 77 child care centers, 55 child care homes, 10 local Head Start programs, seven half-day preschool programs and 33 public pre-kindergartens to date.

Smart Start funding has helped more than 950 local

teachers of young children further their educations. Most are taking college courses toward a degree in early childhood education.

Smart Start funds classes for parents and has provided one-on-one coaching for troubled families and adolescent mothers. Parents are assisted in finding quality care and subsidies are provided to families who cannot afford to provide care.
